

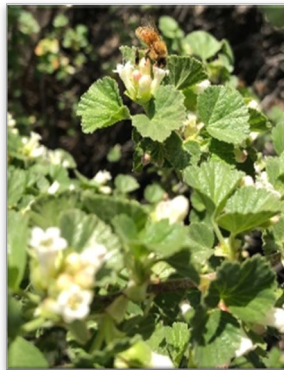
I SPY IN DOUGLAS COUNTY
